49. 0 CUBAN REBELS LAND AT AGUACATAL. A group of 18 insurgents from the Cuban revolution recently occupied the ruins of Aguacatal, according to word received from Cecil L. H. Branson of Cd. del Carmen, Campeche, Mexico. Mexican military authorities have jailed most of them in Carmen. One Cuban rebel, however, was buried at the ruins.

Aguacatal, identified by Dr. M. Wells Jakeman as very probably the original walled city Tulan of the Spanish chronicles and walled city Bountiful of the Book of Mormon, was further excavated during the past winter by BYU archaeologists (Newsletter, 48.01). The modern invaders doubtlessly did not realize they were taking refuge within the walls of an ancient stronghold.

49. 1 FREE PUBLICATIONS LISTED. The UAS general secretary-treasurer has prepared a complete list of past publications available at the BYU Department of Archaeology; it is attached as a supplement to the present Newsletter.

Most of the publications listed are available to Society members free of charge, upon request. According to a decision of the UAS Executive Committee, May 26, 1954 (Newsletter, 20.1), members are entitled to a maximum of three free past publications per year of membership. This regulation applies whether the publication consists of a single sheet or many pages.

Certain Society publications, however, require a sale price. These are also included in the list, with their respective prices and special reduced prices to Society members.

The various series of the UAS and the BYU Department of Archaeology are listed in full, even though a considerable number of issues are now out of print.

Included in the list are nine papers by Paul Henning, interpreter for the 1900 BYU expedition to Central and South American and later Inspector of Archaeological Monuments for the Republic of Mexico. Mr. Henning died in Oaxaca in 1923. Afterwards, the Heber

J. Grant Library of BYU acquired his personal library, which is now called the "Henning Collection" and constitutes an important portion of the Special Collections section. Reprints of a number of his articles were acquired at that time. In 1948 Mr. Henning was post-humously listed as a Benefactor of the BYU Department of Archaeology.

Thirty-eight papers by Albert R. Reagan are also listed. Dr. Reagan served for 30 years in the US Indian Field Service and for ten years as ethnological contributor to the Bureau of American Ethnology. He was appointed special professor anthropology at BYU in June, 1934, and continued in this capacity until his death in May, 1936. His reprints were made available through the courtesy of his late widow, Mrs. Otilla R. Reagan, and of his personal friend, Dr. Vasco M. Tanner, BYU professor of zoology and entomology. Dr. Reagan was also posthumously listed as a Benefactor of the Department of Archaeology in 1948.

49. 2 ARCHAEOLOGY TO BE TAUGHT AT RICKS COLLEGE, Dr. Ross T. Christensen, assistant professor of Archaeology at BYU, has accepted a teaching appointment at Ricks College during the coming summer.

The 1958 Summer School of the BYU-Ricks Adult Education Center, Ricks College, Rexburg, Idaho, will offer four classes in archaeology. During the first term, from June 16 to July 18, classes entitled "Introduction to Archaeology" (4 hrs.) and "General Near Eastern and Biblical Archaeology" (3 hrs.) will be taught. During the second term, scheduled to run from July 21 to August 22, "Ancient Civilizations of America" (introduction to Book of Mormon archaeology; 3 hrs.) and "Field Archaeology" (4 hrs.) will be given. Plans for the last-mentioned class include excavating an actual Indian ruin in the vicinity of Rexburg.
