89.0 SYMPOSIUM DATE APPROACHING. With the approach of May 16---the date set for the Fifteenth Annual Symposium on the Archaeology of the Scriptures (Newsletter, 88.3)--we choose this yearly gathering as the theme for the present Newsletter.

Co-sponsored by the Department of Archaeology of Brigham Young University and the University Archaeological Society, these annual symposia have as their purpose that of facilitating "the exchange of ideas on the part of students of archaeology as it pertains to the Bible, the Book of Mormon, and the Pearl of Great Price... The Symposia have been an important factor in developing scriptural archaeology as a scholarly discipline among Latter-day Saints. Over the years a great deal of important information on this subject has been presented at these gatherings for the first time" (Newsletter, 87.2).

In order that the reader may grasp the full significance of that statement, the following historical notes and bibliography of the Symposia are submitted.

89.1 HISTORICAL NOTES ON THE ANNUAL SYM-POSIUM. An important assignment given to the Department of Archaeology of BYU at the time of its establishment in December, 1946, was to serve the University and the LDS church as a genter for research and publication on the archaeology of the Scriptures.

Somewhat over two years later, on April 18, 1949, the University Archaeological Society was founded as an arm of the Department to assist it in fulfilling this assignment. This came about as the result of suggestions by the late Dr. John A. Widtsoe, then of the Executive Committee of the BYU Board of Trustees. The special function of the Society was to disseminate among its members information concerning recent archaeological discoveries and research bearing on the LDS scriptures.

One of the ways that were found by which to fulfill this assignment was the Annual Symposium on the Archaeology of the Scriptures. The first major meeting of the UAS was, in fact, the Symposium held on November 3 and 4, 1949, after the Society had been in existence only six months. Two earlier public meetings, however, which had been held by the Department of Archaeology in 1947 and 1948 before the Society came into existence, were designated ex post facto Numbers One and Two in the Symposium series.

From the Third Symposium in 1949 until the Sixth in 1952, the annual gatherings were held on the Brigham Young University campus in the autumn or early winter, except for two sessions of the Fifth, held in Salt Lake City. The Campus Chapter of the Society played a key role in these early meetings.

Beginning with the Seventh Symposium, that of 1953, the meetings were held in June, concurrently with and as a special feature of the annual campus Leadership Week (now Education Week) of Brigham Young University. This arrangement continued until the Eleventh Symposium, that of June, 1958.

Beginning with the Twelfth Symposium, that of 1960, the event has been disconnected from the annual BYU Leadership Week, and from that year on has been held on the campus in April. Once again the Campus Chapter has assisted in the preparations.

The Thirteenth and Fourteenth Symposia were held respectively in 1961 and 1963 with the assistance of BYU Special Courses and Conferences.

The Fifteenth Annual Symposium, scheduled for next month in Salt Lake City, will be presented with the assistance of the Salt Lake Chapter of the UAS. Further details are given below, 89.2 and 89.3.

89.2 SYMPOSIUM BIBLIOGRAPHY. There follows a complete listing of papers presented at the third to fourteenth Annual Symposia on the Archaeology of the Scriptures, as preserved in Society records. To this is appended the program of the Fifteenth Symposium, planned for next May 16.

M. Harvey Taylor, PAUL HENNING: EARLY LATTER-DAY SAINT ARCHAEOLOGIST. The life of a German convert to Mormonism, probably the first Latter-day Saint to become a professional archaeologist; and an evaluation of his work in the field of Middle American-Book of Mormon archaeology.

Welby W. Ricks, A PURPORTED PHOENICIAN INSCRIPTION IN NEW MEXICO. An inscription on stone found in a dry arroyo near Los Lunas, New Mexico, records, in ancient Phoenician (Canaanite-Old Hebrew) script, extracts from the Ten Commandments. A critical study is made of this find as to its origin and authenticity.

Read H. Putnam, WERE THE PLATES OF MORMON OF TUMBAGA? Reasons for believing that the plates of the Book of Mormon were of an alloy used in pre-Spanish times in the New World which was frequently treated so as to present surfaces of pure gold and yet be lighter in weight than that metal.

M. Wells Jakeman, A POSSIBLE REMNANT OF THE NEPHITES IN ANCIENT YUCATAN. Some of the extensive evidence that the builders of the ancient Maya civilization of Yucatan were an Israelitish-Christian-like people.

89.4 FREE PUBLICATIONS AVAILABLE FROM UAS OFFICE. The UAS general secretary-treasurer has called attention to Society regulations concerning free past publications to which members are entitled.

Whenever a new membership in the Society is issued, a copy of a five-page green list of 140 items available under this privilege is sent to the new member. If he wishes, he may request and receive up to five of these per year of membership, free of charge, provided no sale price is indicated. The member makes the selections himself.

This list includes past issues of the UAS Newsletter and other publications of the Society and the BYU Department of Archaeology, also reprints of many articles by Albert B. Reagan, Paul Henning, and others.

These publications are free and may not be purchased, unless a sale price is mentioned (Newsletter, 49.1, 66.33)

(Publications which are for sale are also indicated on the green list, with special prices for UAS members. Any number of these may be purchased without this affecting the free-publications privilege.)

This free-past-publications privilege is not cumulative or retroactive; that is, the request should be placed during the year when the membership is in force. Free publications may not be requested for previous years of membership (Newsletter, 50.4). In case the member wishes more than five of the free publications at a time, it is suggested that several years of membership be obtained in advance; fee, \$3 per year.

89.5 ARCHAEOLOGY CLASSES OFFERED IN SUM-MER SCHOOL. The catalog of courses for the 1964 BYU Summer School lists three undergraduate classes in archaeology.

Archaeology 200, "Introduction to Archaeology," three semester-hours, will be offered during the first five-week term. The same courses will be repeated during the second term.

Archaeology 310 and 311, "Archaeology and the Scriptures," two semester-hours each, will be offered during the first and second terms, respectively. During the first term, the Bible and the Pearl of Great Price will be examined in the light of archaeology. During the second term, the Book of Mormon will be considered. Either 310 or 311 may be taken without the other, but No. 200 should be taken before either of them (or may be taken concurrently).

Three graduate courses in archaeology will also be offered during the 1964 Summer School.

Registration day for the first term of Summer School is June 15. The term ends on July 17. The Second term runs from July 20 to August 21.

89. 6 EXTENSION TALKS IN ARCHAEOLOGY. Faculty members of the BYU Department of Archaeology are scheduled to give several lectures during 1964 on the archaeology of the Scriptures, under the BYU Adult Education and Extension Services.

Dr. M. Wells Jakeman will speak on American Indian origins and Book of Mormon archaeology. April 24 and 25, in southern California. On Friday, April 24, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m., he will lecture at Reseda. On Saturday, April 25, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. and from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m., he will lecture at Long Beach.

On Saturday, April 25, Dr. Ross T. Christensen will give three lectures at St. George, Utah, on "Scrolls, Stones, and the Old World Scriptures," "Native Scriptures of the New World," and "Theories of American Indian Origin." He will join four other BYU professors in presenting an all-day seminar or "Education Day."

Dr. Christensen will speak on the same subjects at three-day "Education Weeks" to be held in Las Vegas, Nevada, June 4-6, at Jordan Valley, June 17-19, Granger-Kearns, June 22-24, and Sugarhouse, June 25-27, all in the Salt Lake area; and at Preston, Idaho, August 26-28.
